# BOARD DISMISSES STATE EMPLOYEES

## Two Veteran Members of Education Forces Let Out by Majority

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 11 (AP)—The state board of education replaced two veterans members of its finance division today—Curtis Booher, assistant director, and Roy Emans, budget examiner.

Loyd Cossey, Arnett school superintendent, was named to succeed Booher and W. H. Clashy, Orlando superintendent, replaced Emans.

The action continued changes begun last winter when James Staten, Nowata, was named director of the division, succeeding Floyd Ramsey.

Booher's release was by a 4-to-3 vote on motion of Richard Martin, Muskogee. Opposing it were the Rev. W. B. Harvey, Oklahoma City, Harry D. Simmons, Wewoka, and A. L. Crable, state superintendent of public instruction.

Harvey said the action came as a surprise to him.

Simmons and Crable voted against replacing Emans, who had been in the department five years.

Budgets set up today by the board provided no place for Houston Wright, former state NYA administrator, who was reported in line for a position in the vocational division. Wright was reported to have been supported by Governor Phillips for a place in the department.

## Speed Up Gun Output

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., July 11 (AP)—Col. G. H. Stewart, in command at the Springfield armory, said today he had urged war department officials to speed up plant expansion to bring about a daily output of 1,000 Garand rifles. The output last month was 200 daily and the immediate objective is 400.

So now the girls and their menagerie are on their way to sunny California—they hope.

For six years the girls and "Silver S." have traveled long and far and not a slip in a trip.

They even carry a letter from the Golden Gate Exposition saying "Gate's Open—Fun is free." "And will we take 'em" said Darlene Dorgan, driver and owner.

Three brunettes and two blondes, all brown as life savers, clad in slacks, bandanas and all the junk they could possibly carry, piled into their luxury-tolier and sped into adventure.

"We must look pretty scary," laughed Ruth Gustafson, "for when we were in Canada, a filling station attendant called the police and said we were 'gun-girls.' That was when we were on our way to visit the 'Quints' and were guests of Doctor Dafoe."
